A Change in the Wind

Just as the weather in Arkansas can never be predicted or expected, so the winds of change at the shelter keep moving in unexpected ways. The last year has seen the construction of a new wing to house long-term children, several staff changes, a slow economy, an increased need for sheltering children in need, and a large dose of faith that everything will work out.

When the OAS Board starting looking at the possibility of adding a new wing for children on a long-term basis, they knew the significant need for this in the state of Arkansas from discussions with the Department of Human Services (DHS) and took a leap of faith. They got a state grant and a federal low-interest rate loan, and were confident of a government contract from DHS that the shelter can apply for every four years. Then the winds changed. The building began, but government budgets were cut, including DHS. Moreover, changes in staff at the shelter along with a tougher economy brought about a decline in donations to the shelter.

But perhaps the winds will change again. Just like devastation from severe weather in Arkansas calls communities to work together for the good of others, so might we all pull together to help the shelter meet the needs of the abused and neglected children that call it home.

Pat Beaverson, the Open Arms Shelter director, has resigned, and Susan Bransford, retired OAS director, has stepped in as interim until a new director can be hired. We also changed bookkeepers at the end of last year. With changes in staff, there were some thank-you notes, honorariums, memorials and tax letters that weren't recognized properly. Please forgive if you did not see names mentioned in the memorials and honorariums in the newsletter, or get a timely thank-you note or tax letter. We have addressed these problems and have taken measures to correct them. And with our promise of doing better, please consider making a donation to the shelter in honor or memory of someone special.

With the current cut-backs in DHS funding, we are planning to have three long-term beds in the new building until we can raise the funds for the other nine beds. Some of these might be used for emergency beds as well.


